Progress of **Building Program**

The Works Progress Administration has appropriated approximatey \$80,000 for repairs on the o'd school building, the construction of six new rooms, and a gymnasium.

The newly completed rooms include the library, the departments of commerce, home economics, history, mathmetics, and business arithmetic.

The gymnasium will be equipped with bleacher seats and will have a seating capacity of seven hundred people. The stage will be in the west end of the building with dressing rooms on both sides. The bottom floor will consist of a general assembly room, a band room, and shower rooms. It will be one of the best physical education departments in Harlan County and the band room will be considered the best in the state.

It is estimated that the new building will be completed in approximately three months.
