



#### Freshman Class


The class of '41 was composed of forty-five members. Before the year ended these boys and girls had proved to be a most versatile group, capable of taking responsible parts in the school activities.


On the gridiron and on the hardwood the class was represented by these athletes:

Brassfield, and Hamby, in basketball only.





































#### FORENSIC CLUB




The active members of the Forensic Club

convincingly by the close of the season.


The question for debate this year was,

The debaters appreciated the coaching and supervision of Mr. Hume, the helpful suggestions of Mrs. Wiley, and the services of members of the community who acted as judges.








