"Melodrama In Nankipoo"

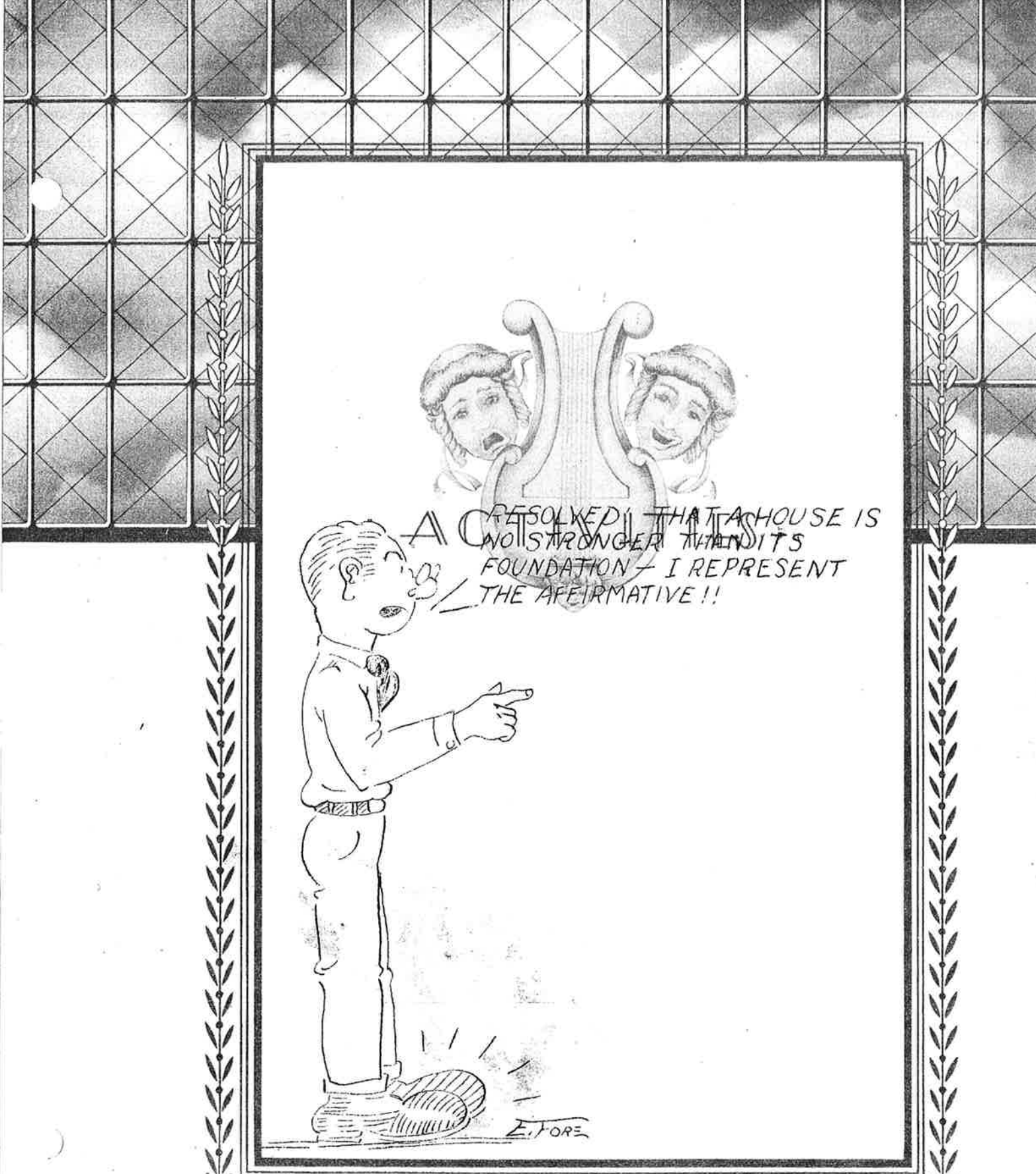
