Then came Geraldine Mullins and Bernice Hurley. Geraldine wore a blue gown and carried white roses. Bernice carried American Beauty roses.


Next were Jackie Helton and Erma Lawson both wearing blue gowns. Jackie's roses were pink and Erma's were red and white.

"Arrowsmith", by Sinclair Lewis

"Arrowsmith", written by one of America's best known authors, is a book that will be enjoyed by everyone who reads it.

Martin Arrowsmith is the main character of the book and proves to be a very courageous man, whose hope to become great is undying. With the aid and influence of Dr. Max Gottlieb, Martin becomes quite a successful doctor of medicine. Among his best friends is Dr. Terry Wickett also a colleague of Dr. Gottlieb.

Martin had always been interested in science so he joined the McGurk Institute where he developed a serum for a certain plague in India.

The laboratory sent Martin to India with his serum. While they were in India Martin's wife died of the plague and Martin returned to the United States a hero.

The second year Home Ec is a mixed class with both girls and boys and both are taking the same unit. At the present they are making dresses and gown aprons.

General Industrial Arts Classes

This course for boys was started the second semester under the direction of Mr. Boultinghouse. Mr. Boultinghouser stayed only two weeks and the course is now under the direction of Mr. Montgomery. Seventy-seven students are enrolled. They are each grouped into four classes with each having its general manager, assistant manager, librarian, foreman, too checkers, and safety man.

Much has already been accomplished this semester and next year we are expecting great headway when we will be fully equipped and the course will be a fully accredited subject with two groups running for three hours a class. Over three hundred dollars worth of tools have already been received and a great many more are on the way.

The chief purpose of the class this semester is to give the boys a general idea of the course. Starting next year the two main phases of the course will be Electrical Training and Woodwork.

The State Department of Vocational Education is sponsoring the course with the cooperation of Mr. L. J. Speed, president of the Black Star Coal Corporation.
